A Word From The Interim Priest-in-Charge

I'm very pleased to be able to connect with you by means of this Newsletter.

I hope that over the weeks and months that lie ahead I will be able to get to know many of you more than simply shaking your hand at the door of the church as you leave on a Sunday morning.

Just a couple of lines about myself, so you can begin to have a sense of who this person is. I was born in Sudbury and lived there through my formative years. I have always considered Scarborough to be my other home, having moved here in 1977 to study at Trinity College. My first parish was in Scarborough, and I had the privilege of serving in this Deanery for over 10 years before moving to other ministries.

As you likely know, I am here on an interim basis until the parish Search Committee and the Area Bishop agree on the next person who will come to be with this parish family as its Incumbent.

There are at least two ways of approaching and working through an interim ministry. One is to simply "hold down the fort," so to speak. In other words, in this model the Interim Priest-in-Charge intentionally works at simply maintaining the status quo, if you will.

The other model is to approach the interim time as an opportunity to do some self-examination, to agree on what may be working well, and to also discern where God may be calling the congregation to go and what



God may be calling us to be in the years that lie before us.

This model can be seen as a gift to the life of a congregation. A gift that allows us to take stock and to prayerfully discern what we ought to be about in this corner of God's vineyard.

Let me assure you that I don't see myself as one who is here to stir things up. At the same

time, I believe that any organization (and a parish church is an organization) needs to occasionally take stock of itself and determine if it is fulfilling its calling in the best way possible. The time of an Interim can be used to do this.

I leave it with you to think and pray about this.

I want to thank the Wardens, the Curate, Parish Secretary, and others who have welcomed me and helped me begin to feel a part of this parish family. Please know that I am here to accompany and to offer my pastoral care to you.

A Message from Rev. Monique

If my people who are called by my name humble themselves, pray, seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land. (2 Chronicles 7:14)



We are a little more than half way through the season of Lent as I write this, and the subject of prayer has been on my mind. Prayer and praying for one another is something that I seem to mention often in my

newsletter reflections, but it seems to be on my mind even more this Lent. Perhaps it is because of two events that I attended recently. The first was the York Scarborough Town Hall held at St. Andrew's on Saturday, March 3; and the second was the Toronto Prayer Breakfast that I attended with other members of St. Andrew's, on March 6th. Perhaps it is also because Lent is a time of prayer and self-reflection: a time of intimate conversation with God through his Son, Jesus Christ. And perhaps it is because St. Andrew's, while we are still in a time of transition and challenge, still has much to be grateful for. Likely it is for all these reasons that prayer is a subject that has occupied my thoughts lately.

There were, I would say, about one hundred people at St. Andrew's on a recent March Saturday morning for the York Scarborough Town Hall meeting. A number of parishes in the area were represented and a good number of those in attendance were from St. Andrew's. We were asked to discuss certain questions among our table groups concerning our hopes and our vision for the future of the church in York Scarborough. Some of the questions we were asked to consider were along the lines of: What did we believe are the needs of the community we are in? What might we do to meet those needs? And, what should we stop doing in order to meet those needs? There were very many excellent suggestions, but it wasn't until almost the end of the discussion that one of the table representatives stood up and said, "We should

pray." Of course, everyone agreed and, while it may have been a surprise that this suggestion would come only close to the end, it seemed somehow an appropriate ending or wrap up to all the earlier discussion that we had had. So many good ideas were proposed and discussed, it seemed right to me that once all was said and done what we needed to do then was pray.

The second event I attended recently was the Toronto Prayer Breakfast. There were over 300 people at this event the purpose of which is to pray for the city: for the leaders of the city, the emergency first responders, the educators, business leaders, the youth, clergy and faith leaders, and many others. But another purpose of the Prayer Breakfast is to foster ecumenical discussion of prayer and the importance of prayer. The guest speaker at the Prayer Breakfast reminded us of the story of Abraham pleading for whatever righteous people there were in Sodom when God had decided to destroy the city for its wickedness. Because of Abraham's prayer, God agreed that he would not destroy the city if even a few righteous people could be found there. Prayer, the speaker suggested, is important, effective and it is one of the ways we participate in God's work for the Kingdom here in this place, one of the ways we show God's love to others. Something Mayor John Tory said in his greeting stayed with me. He said that he appreciates the faith groups in the city for all that we do; not only that we help people when they are down on their luck but because we nourish them with faith. We feed them and nourish them with faith in some of the most difficult times and situations they have to face in life. And that faith sustains them. Part of the way we help them continue in faith is that we teach them and encourage them to pray and we pray for them.

Prayer has been on my mind of late in this season of prayer and self-reflection. I was reminded at two different events of both the importance of and the value of prayer. And so, once again, I want to encourage all of you, as we approach Holy Week and Easter Day, to pray for one another. As we enter into a time of discernment and selection at St. Andrew's, let us keep one another, the parish as a whole, and the community around us before God in prayer.

We hope that all enjoyed the season of Advent, Christmas, and the New Year.

Following are the highlights of the first quarter of 2018:

The Rt Rev. Michele Pollesel - First of all, it's our pleasure to welcome Bishop Michele as our interim priest-in-charge. As you are aware, Rev. Chris Horne had to retire because of health reasons. Our sincere thank you to Rev. Chris for her service to this parish. We saw a series of changes to our worship during her period which were appreciated by many. Our appreciation to Bishop Michele for consenting to take up the position as interim priest-in-charge. We are confident that he, with his vast experience, will be able to guide the parish in the right direction.

Our appreciation is also due to Rev. Monique for the long hours and hard work she put in during the period when Rev. Chris was not able to be present due to heath issues.

- Parish selection committee This group of parishioners who were entrusted with the responsibility of selecting an incumbent for this parish is continuing their work. The group has now completed the parish profile and forwarded it to Bishop Robertson for review. On completion of the review, this document will be posted on the church's website. This is viewed as the guiding document for potential applicants. The team is now working on the next stage of the process which is preparing the procedure and questions for interviewing potential candidates. Our thank you to all the members of this team. Please remember them in your prayers.
- Church's finances Our finances continue to be of major concern. This year shows a decrease in income and expenses compared to 2017. However, it is important to note that our expenses exceed the income by \$4200. It is also important to note that we have to carry out the mandatory maintenance/repairs to the building as recommended by the building inspectors. The wardens met with our property consultant to identify action items. Identified repair work is now

being quoted for by contractors. We will pick and authorize repairs as appropriate.

- Building security We noticed that not all the keys in circulation and the individuals or groups using them can be identified. This is a security risk. As a result, it was decided to re-key the locks in the building. This exercise will start soon. Parish groups requiring keys are requested to prepare a list and forward it through their respective group leaders.
- Vestry meeting We had a successful vestry meeting. Our thank you to all the organizers and volunteers for hosting this event. Our special thank you for Loraine Wilson for her invaluable service in taking care of the financials and organizing a successful audit. Special appreciation is also due to all the elected and appointed officials for agreeing to continue for another term at the request of the wardens.

Pastoral Care at the Church of St. Andrew

Since we missed submitting a Vestry Report outlining fully how the pastoral team cares for those who are ill in hospital, in a nursing home, housebound, or in any special need, I thought it should be given some exposure to the many ways we reach out and are "alongside" of them.

We have a list of about 23 parishioners who are visited regularly. A member of the clergy and a lay pastoral visitor are assigned two or three parishioners to whom they bring the Eucharist if they wish to receive, or a listening ear and a time of prayer. At the moment, we have a team of 4 active lay pastoral visitors.

Once a month, Holy Eucharist is celebrated at the Rayoak Nursing Home and The Wexford Retirement Home by a member of the clergy and two lay members. The residents are always so very grateful for these visits. It is always so heartwarming to receive their love in return.

During the year, get-well cards, special birthday or anniversary cards and sympathy cards are sent. Twice a year at Easter and Christmas, the Ladies' Lunch & Learn Group create gift baskets or flower arrangements for these special parishioners. More gratefulness!

At any time during the year, when someone becomes ill or is in the hospital, prayers are offered, telephone calls and visits are made, flowers are sent.

Pastoral Care is not only a ministry for the clergy or lay pastoral visitors, but for each one of us. It is God's gift through us to others in need of love and friendship, for someone to be God's presence with them in times of illness, age, or loneliness.

The Clearing Season

I am now at the end of my clearing and I know I will be able to walk with my Lord on Palm Sunday, with the other women on Good Friday and share in His agony and suffering.

The Clearing preparation will also allow me to be there, when we are told: "He is risen, He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

Then I can truly celebrate the joy of Easter. Happy Easter!

Being in an "interim" period, with the Parish Selection Committee working on the process of finding a new incumbent, I thought it might be worth re-reading the following notes from Ken Holder that were published in the March 1995 newsletter. Ken was chair of the committee that developed the mission statement, which was ultimately approved by Parish Council and Vestry.

What's in A Mission Statement?

What is this "buzz word" we keep hearing these days wherever we turn? Why do we need a Mission Statement? Why have so many parishioners been spending so much time on this topic?

Simply stated, a Mission Statement is a formal declaration of the main purpose for the existence of an organization, institution or business. While it is usually associated with a long-term purpose, organizations can and do occasionally change or amend their Mission Statement.

We, like many organizations, have observed a number of trends which indicate that "business as usual" is not a feasible option. The world has changed dramatically over the past ten years and will continue to change. Resources are becoming scarcer and many organizations are competing for our time and for our limited funds. It is incumbent on all, therefore, to use these scarce resources of time and money as efficiently and effectively as possible.

How does all this apply to the church? For example, the following trends require a strategy; the effects of an aging membership, declining attendance and total givings, to name a few. We have to do some serious planning on how to turn the situation around from decline to growth. We must begin by being clear about our purpose or objective, and by working together with a common understanding of what we want to achieve and how we can work together to accomplish this objective. The Mission Statement helps us to focus on that common purpose.

Mindful of the importance of developing a common vision and purpose for the Parish, the objective of the Planning Committee in this exercise is to encourage maximum participation of parishioners.

As a first step, the Parish Council was given the opportunity to help develop the Mission Statement, following the presentation of draft proposals by the Planning Committee. All comments and suggestions from members were fully considered, and agreement was reached as to the wording of the final statement. This required at least four meetings before a healthy consensus was reached at the January 17, 1995 meeting of Parish Council.

The Parish Council agreed to recommend the following Mission Statement for the consideration and approval of the Parish at a Special Vestry meeting to be arranged at a later date:

"To Love and Worship God as One Family in Jesus Christ; To Extend this Love into Christian Action in the Community"

We hope to achieve this by:

- regularly re-affirming our commitment to growth in Christ; constantly renewing our baptismal covenant and obtaining a Christian vision of the Kingdom of God, through daily prayer, regular attendance at church and a careful study of the scriptures;
- spreading the "good news" the offer of salvation to all people, in the power of the Holy Spirit, to be received through faith in Christ;

 acknowledging our love of God will lead to loving others - thereby helping us to reach out and help people in need wherever they are - serving, caring and nurturing others with the compassion of God.

(These three paragraphs provide an elaboration of what our Mission Statement means to us and are equally as important as, if not more so than, the short form statement).

Next Steps

- The above Mission Statement will be presented to the parish for information and discussion at two (2) three-hour sessions on Saturday June 3rd in the parish hall. Parishioners will be free to attend either of these sessions, the same presentation will be done at each.
- To the extent that time permits, parishioners will be given the opportunity to participate in a discussion about the

things we should be doing in our parish, in support of the Mission Statement, that are either not being done at all or are being done but need to be done better of differently. Parishioners will also be encouraged to participate in helping to establish the priorities among the list of proposed alternatives that should be tackled this year and beyond.

3. The recommendations from this meeting will go forward to a formal Special Vestry Meeting for approval at a later date.

While this is not an absolutely necessary part of the process, it is strongly recommended that we obtain formal approval of these initiatives at Vestry. Among other reasons, it will foster a strong commitment to working together, in an organized manner, towards common shared goals and objectives.

A classically trained soloist, Dr. Hurlock is also an ordained minister and a music teacher. He performs in five languages: German, Italian, French, Spanish and English.




